Region says Sixth Line well too costly

According to the region report there are a total of 1,480 single detached equivalent units of water available, 153 of those haven't been allocated.

"We're not draft-approving any more plans of subdivision unless we have water allocation," said Gastle. She added there will be pressure put on developers who have had water allocations for many years but haven't built, to build or their water allocation may be taken away from them.

If Halton council accepts its staff's recommendations not to pursue the Sixth Line well and to investigate alternative sources of ground water, regional staff plans to appear before the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) again next Friday to request all subdivision applications in Georgetown be adjourned until next spring. Until water can be found and believed to be brought on line within three years, regional staff will continue to recommend no further approvals of draft plans of subdivision and other developments in Georgetown be granted.

There are currently four subdivision appli-

cations in Georgetown before the OMB, Silver Creek (35 units), Troisville Phase 3 (45 units), and Halton Hills Village Homes Inc. (2,286 units).

Halton Hills Village Homes has been drilling test wells near Silver Creek in its own search for water, but also hasn't been success-

Murphy said in his report that its worth looking at the Lindsay Court well for increased water taking and region staff want to evaluate the option using computer modeling.

The region also plans to look for other possible groundwater sources through geophysical investigation.

Groundwater, surface water, Lake Ontario water and water conservation are being assessed by a Public Liaison Committee working with Halton staff to find water for planned growth in Georgetown's urban area up to 48,000 people in 2021 from the current 30,000.

"I would say when the region is searching (for water) that all options are considered," said Gastle when asked about lake water. She added lake water would be "our last option."
