Parents must reinforce message of acceptance: board

Dear editor,

(The following letter was sent to all Halton District School Board (HDSB) parents.)

On Tuesday, Sept. 11 the world changed as a result of events in the United States. We join in condemning those who carried out these contemptible terrorist acts against innocent civilians. Our hearts go out to the families and friends of the victims of this tragedy.

As a school system, student safety remains our primary concern. We will remain diligent in watching for any signs of racial, religious or cultural tensions emerging within our school community.

The HDSB's guiding principles state we are committed to providing a caring and safe environment that also recognizes the rights and dignity of all. This commitment is echoed in the Ontario Human Rights Code, the Ministry of

Education's Safe School Policy and our own Code of Behaviour. We want to assure parents we will be vigilant in guarding against inappropriate behaviour, and determined in our efforts to provide a safe environment for all students and staff.

We offer the following to assist parents in reinforcing a message of acceptance, understanding and respect:

• Continue to be vigilant for any sign of inappropriate behaviour and reprisals against others based on faith and/or ethnicity. Actions based on hate, whether they are verbal or physical harassment, insults, name-calling, celebratory behaviour, intimidation, hate-based graffiti, or mischief cannot be tolerated.

• Remind your child to report any such incidents immediately to the principal. Principals will investigate all allegations.

• Encourage students to talk to

a teacher or administrator if they have concerns about the behaviour of a fellow student or if they know of a student who is being harassed or intimidated. Explain their cooperation is important for everyone's safety.

 Be aware of your conversations and your choice of words and expressions when you are near children/students

• When talking with your child, emphasize how tragic it is that hate exists and the negative impact that hate-related activity and dissension can have on all of us. Encourage acceptance and understanding. Let your child talk about how he/she feels.

• Stress that the acts of a few do no reflect or speak for the beliefs or behaviour of a religious or ethnic group.


For terrorists to blow up a plane in the air, they would have to bypass ground security and board the plane heavily armed. This hopefully can be avoided with the tighter airport security.
