ne team is looking to climb its way back to the top, the other is trying to prevent others from knocking it from its perch.

The Georgetown District High School Rebels boys volleyball teams find themselves in unique positions, but in the end, working toward the same goal. The junior boys team dismantled Lord Elgin 25-4, 25-17 on Tuesday to improve its record to 6-0. The senior boys, the defending Ontario champions, rebounded from their first loss in Halton league play in more than two years by downing Lord Elgin 25-7, 25-12. They're now 5-1.

The junior Rebels have yet to be forced to a third game this season and that has them looking like the favourites to win the Halton title, which they last captured three years ago. With five returning players from last year's squad, the Rebels knew they would have a strong team.

"We knew there was a lot of potential there," said Ashley Willis, one of three senior students coaching the team. "They put up a good offence and their blocking is great. They work together as a team on defence."

Even when setter Mike Haines went down with an inury, rookie Dylan Malchin was able to step into the role without the Rebels missing a beat. Malchin and Goran Vlacic, one of the team's strongest attackers, are two Grade 9s currently starting for the Rebels, ensuring that they will be

a force even next year when some of their players graduate to the senior Rebels.

The seniors already have two junior-aged players on the team this season. The senior Rebels found themselves in the unusual position of trying to bounce back from a loss after they fell to Nelson last week.

"It was a case of getting a little too high," said Rebels' coach Jonas Kaciulis. "We had a similar situation in a game against Acton. They were a good team and they took a game from us. We were so used to having success and we got a rude awaken-

Kaciulis has been running the team through tough practices to remind them of what got them to OFSSA last year— hard work. He has been focusing on strength training and he said the results are already showing in their jumping ability. That will be important as the team attempts to overcome its biggest weakness— one it can't do anything about—its height.

"It's eerily similar to last year in that we hit that bump and now everyone's starting to press again," the Rebels coach said. "The last week was almost like going to boot camp and they, ve already turned it around and they're on an upswing."


