

Glen boundary meeting set for Wednesday

Local landowners who want to be included within the expanded boundaries of Glen Williams will get a chance to present their case Wednesday.

A draft plan, revising the hamlet's secondary plan, calls for a 220-acre expansion of the boundary for new development. The expansion will allow for moderate growth—about 176 lots over the next 10-20 years to an eventual population of about 2,000 residents—as well as protection of natural and heritage features.

Property owners will be able to meet with Glen Williams Secondary Plan's steering committee which is comprised of residents, developers, and councillors. The committee has been working with town planners and consultants to create the new plan, and presented it to council at a recent meeting.

However, at that meeting, Halton Hills landowner Rick Stull objected to the exclusion of part of his property located on the south-east side of Eighth Line/22 Sideroad.

Planning consultant Clare Riepma, who represented the Stulls at the meeting, said fairness was at issue—a portion of their 130-acre property is designated as greenland, but another part, which is developable, was not included.

"It's seems (the Stulls) are being asked to give up quite a bit, without getting anything back," said Riepma.

Council agreed to give the Stulls a chance to present their case before the steering committee before the public meeting on the proposed plan.

The steering committee meeting has been scheduled for Wednesday (Nov. 28) at 5:30 p.m. Any other landowner with a similar grievance, and wishing to attend the meeting, should contact Steve Burke of the town's planning department.

The public meeting, which had been tentatively scheduled for Dec. 3, will now be postponed to sometime in January.

Councillor Ron Chatten requested that maps be made clearer in the report before the public meeting.

"I see this document as great fodder for the OMB (Ontario Municipal Board)," he said. "Many of the lines (boundaries) look to me...as very arbitrary. 'I paid money to help with the consultant so my lands are in, I didn't pay, my lands are out.' ... I don't know if that's case."

Town manager of planning policy, John Linhardt said the boundaries were developed through discussions with the staff, the consultant and the steering committee.

"We recognize there is going to be considerable debate throughout the process as to what the appropriate boundaries are, because there are differing viewpoints," he said, adding those viewpoints are expected to be aired at the public meeting.
