"I've been on and off but I feel if I work as hard as I can every shift I can help out," is Bibic's modest assessment of his season. That description actually better suits the Raiders as a whole as they fell to 11-14-3 and sixth place in the Provincial Jr. A Hockey League's West Conference with Saturday's 7-5 loss to Oakville.

Bibic, who has been a steady contributor, had a goal and an assist, giving the rookie seven goals and 26 points in 27 games.

The Raiders may have a chance to improve upon their record. After Friday's game in Bramalea, the Raiders play five of seven games against the conference's bot-

tom three teams.

"The league is so tight from third down that if you put together a streak you can move up pretty quickly," said Raider coach Mike Kalapaca.

hroughout the season, the Georgetown District High School Rebels practised a drill called Guts.

At this weekend's Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association (OFSAA) senior boys' volleyball championships, they showed what they had learned from

After losing starting setter Chris Campbell to an ankle injury 10 points into the tournament, Reid Hall, a Grade 9 student, was forced into Campbell's spot to run a completely different offence than what the team had practised. However, the Rebels continued to push opponents to the brink and players such as Kyle Hall, considered by many observers to be among the best players in the tournament, rose to the occasion.

In a rematch of last year's OFSAA final, the Rebels fell 24-26, 25-20, 15-13 to Barrie's Eastview Collegiate. It would be replayed throughout the tournament, in which the Rebels posted a 1-4 record. Three of the Rebels' four losses went to three games twice the margin in the deciding game being two points. The only matches that didn't go the distance were a 26-

24, 31-29 loss to Sir Winston Churchill and the Rebels' 25-11, 25-20 win over Sir John A. Macdonald.

Kaciulis said he has received two emails from opposing coaches since the tournament and was complimented by several coaches and referees at the tournament on the team's performance under adverse conditions.
