OPSEU pickets walking the line

Imployees from the Niagara - Escarpment Commission (NEC) I office in Georgetown have hit the picket lines along with 45,000 other provincial public service employees.

While the office remained open, Norrine Burns, steward for OPSEU Local 227, said Thursday the 17 unionized employees from the office— including planners, clerical, mapping and communications staff— were out on strike.

Burns said pension is one of the strikers' biggest issues.

She said the government wants to eliminate early retirement options for employees and have total control of the surplus in their pension fund.

Other issues include benefits and wages.

Burns said pickets will be set up at all entrances to the Niagara Escarpment Commission office throughout the strike. She said while they are blocking the entrances for NEC staff, they are not blocking the public.

The OPSEU strike is also impacting many other services.

Dave Clark, issuing agent at Driver and Vehicle Licence Office in Georgetown, said, due to the strike, new and replacement driver's licences won't be issued.

However, if your driver's licence is expiring during the strike it will remain valid until the strike is over. But if your licence expired the day before the strike and hadn't been renewed, Clark said you are out of luck.

He said they can issue licence plate stickers as long as you have all the original paperwork.

During the strike Clark said they can't do debit and credit card transactions. The office will remain open.


The project design calls for approximately 1,200,000 square feet of space on a "Greenfield" site in Brampton, Ontario.

Interested parties should have relevant experience in North American hospital facilities and appropriate financial strength or backing.


