Eves' challenge

Tith his first challenge now behind him, Ontario premier-elect Ernie Eves must focus his attention on an even greater task: selling himself and his Progressive Conservative party to an electorate thirsting for change.

Eves, with his second ballot win over Finance Minister Jim Flaherty, appears to be well on the way to healing whatever rifts there may have been in the Tory ranks. The fact other candidates, Tony Clement and Elizabeth Witmer, threw their support behind Eves after the first ballot indicates any hard feelings that may have developed during the campaign for Mike Harris' old job were quickly forgotten.

For the Tories, it is in their best interest to quickly focus their attention on the Liberals who, in the wake of Walkerton, a nervous economy and an OPSEU strike, are smelling blood. Polls indicate their Tories are running 10-15 percentage points behind the Liberals, despite the fact Liberal leader Dalton McGuinty appears no more premier-like than he did during the last election campaign.

The challenge for Eves is to continue with the heart of the Tory doctrine—tax cuts and offering business a friend—while showing the province an Eves-led PC party is more willing to listen to Harris antagonists—labour, teachers and nurses.

Eves must also have workable plans to deal other issues that face the province such as ensuring post-secondary institutions can handle the double cohort of students expected this year, the doctor shortage and finding funds he's promised for education and the environment.
