In point sparring

Read brothers get their kicks

They've taken different approaches but the Read brothers are battling their way to the top of their sport.

Rick and Robin Read took the first step- or kick- toward the world championships in Italy with top placings at the Ontario Karate Association championships in continuous point sparring.

Though their styles are dramatically different, they've been equally successful. Robin won the 30 kg class while Rick was second in the 35 kg class.

Continuous point sparring is like kick boxing but techniques are controlled and contact is limited. The head and body are legal targets and points are scored with either kicks or punches.

Rick, 13, already has a third-place finish at the 2000 world championships to his credit. He takes a patient, calm style in the sport that suits his personality. It was his laid-back nature that led him to the sport while the family was still living in Germany.

"He's a very shy, humble kid," said his mother Beatrix. "The schools can be very different over there. They beat up on one another. Once he started school we put him in karate."

With the experience of the world

championships under his belt, Rick is looking forward to the opportunity to return and use the lessons he learned.

"I watched all the fighters from the different countries," he said. "Normally I just used my legs but I have to use more than that."

Rick is also looking forward to another opportunity to match up against the competitor who beat him in the Ontario championship— the same competitor who gave him his only loss at the worlds.

Ten-year-old Robin picked up the sport a couple years after his brother. He went to his brother's practices and became interested in it himself. Robin didn't emulate his brother's fighting style, though as h goes on the attack and looks to dictate the pace of the match. It was a successful strategy that led him to victory in his first Ontario championship. He wouldn't mind following in his brother's footsteps to the world championships, though.

Training with his brother at the Family United Club in Hamilton, they are looking forward to the Canadian championships May 17-19 in Ottawa. The top three in each class will then earn an entry for the worlds.
