

Halton Hills top dog after dumping Elora 14-11

Mohawks' 23-game unbeaten streak with a 14-11 victory in Sunday's Ontario Lacrosse Association Jr. B home opener.

"Two years we've been fighting to beat those guys," said smiling Bulldog coach Gerald Veltman.

The Bulldogs were the only blemish on Elora's 22-0-1 regular season run— which dated back to June of 2000— having tied the Mohawks in last season's home opener. But Elora got the ultimate revenge by sweeping the Bulldogs in the second round of the playoffs.

The Bulldogs did, however, establish themselves as a team on the rise last season, defeating powerhouses Onondaga and Wallaceburg, the 2001 Founders Cup champions.

Now the Bulldogs, as this year's host of the Founders Cup, are playing a role usually reserved for the defending champions.

"Everybody who plays us wants to prove themself against us. They want to beat us," said Daryl Veltman, who had

Having that kind of confidence could bode well for the Bulldogs, although they teams—a problem they had last year.
