Ralph and Ernie just don't get it

n April 27, I had the honour to address an ethanol conference in Dawson Creek, British Columbia, located in rich farmland in the middle of two oil patches on the border between B.C. and Alberta.

The farmers there are interested in building an 11-million litre ethanol plant that will make use of low quality grain and excess harvest. It was most encouraging to see the interest level in an area financed largely by oil and natural gas revenues.

It was also amazing and encouraging to see the level of acceptance of the fact of global warming by the ranchers in northern Alberta and B.C. when at the same time Ralph Klein is refusing to support the ratification of the Kyoto Accord, especially when there is an increasing crisis in Alberta concerning water.

That weekend, the City of Edmonton issued a plea to its citizens to be very canny about their water use since the reservoirs were at 23 percent of normal level. Ranchers in southern' Alberta are selling their cattle because of drought. The province is now considering reducing the flows on rivers through to Saskatchewan.

Ironically, the oil industry is pumping hundreds of thousands of barrels of water per day into oil wells to force more oil to the surface in a maturing northern Alberta field. All this and Ralph still doesn't get it.

Before he jumped ship, Mike Harris said that he would not endorse the Kyoto Accord PARLIAMENT HILL REPORT Julian Reed

if there were a risk of one job being lost in Ontario. The Province of Ontario does not want to accept the medical association's assessment that heath care costs currently are about \$1 billion per year because of contaminated air.

These two provinces are the main stumbling blocks to a successful ratification which would mean we could start the journey towards reducing our greenhouse gas emissions to 6 per cent below 1990 levels over the next decade or so. It's only a beginning but well worth the pursuit.

Will we end up being able to endorse Kyoto? Whether we do or not, the problems will remain and presumably worsen before

they get better.

A move towards conservation efficiency and renewable energy development are the keys to solving this dilemma. Ralph and Ernie, give us a chance.
