Police, community team up for day of fun

The Halton Regional Police Family Festival may act as a bridge between officers and the community, say organizers, but the bottom line is that the annual event is simply a lot of inexpensive fun.


Set for Saturday, May 11 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Halton Regional Centre (Hwy. 25 in Oakville), the day will feature everything from climbing walls, mini golf, pitching cage and old auto cruise-in to the bomb unit robot, live entertainment, displays and giveaways.

"This is a free family day that is affordable and accessible," said Const. Gregg Davidson. "If not for the barbecue and the penny auction, it's free. If a family of five stays all day and enjoys the barbecue, it will cost them only about \$20."

One exciting feature of the day is the public's chance to see a variety of law enforcement units up close and personal. These include the Bomb Squad, Identification Unit, K9 and Tactical Unit. They can also meet representatives from Canada Customs, CN Police, Conservation Halton, local fire departments, the Ministries of Natural Resources and Transportation, OPP and RCMP.

Entertainment will include magic by Halton Regional Police officer Al Grose, children's performer Paul Behnke, "Britney," Dream Girls and more.

Davidson said he wants to make it clear to the public that the festival is not

for police and their families but for the community "to be invited into our family." Judging by the attendance numbers (700 visitors in 2000, 2,000 in 2001) people seem to be getting the message.

"It's growing every year," said Davidson. "Last year we got double the attendance we planned for."

According to Davidson, positive word of mouth about the fest attracted visitors last year from as far away as Owen Sound and this year he's received calls from many more outside the region who want to attend.

"Everyone is welcome to come," he said. "The event is put on for the people of Halton but we're certainly not going to turn anyone away."

This year, arrangements have been made for additional parking at the Wyecroft Road GO lot and shuttle buses. More food (which they ran out of last year) has also been ordered. Regional headquarters is located at 1151 Bronte Rd.

Proceeds from the barbecue and penny auction at this year's fest will go to the Make-A-Wish Foundation. In 2000, \$4,000 was raised for the Smile Trust Foundation, which in turn provided \$6,000 to two local charities, Child Find Ontario and Food For Thought. Last year, \$6,720 was raised and shared between Rose Cherry's Home, a children's hospice and respite centre being built in Milton, and Toys For Tots.


