Board business superintendent Carla Kisko indicated people will be doing more squirming than wiggling with the dollars they'll likely have at their disposal.


"We have a lot of work left still.... There isn't going to be any surprise when we come to you with a budget that far exceeds the \$281.4 million," Kisko told trustees.
