With this being Police Week 2002 (May 12-18) it is only fitting that we take a moment to thank the men and women of Halton Regional Police Services for the job they do.




Police work is not for everyone, but it can be a very rewarding and challenging job. Ironically, the theme of this year's Police Week is Standing Proud: Careers in Policing.
