Burlington and has asked parents to attend. The board is currently reviewing transportation policy exemptions in order to balance its budget. It will not make a decision on the issue at the meeting but will hear the parents' case for maintaining the busing, even though areas of Georgetown South fall within the board's guidelines (3.2 km for middle school, 4.8 km for high school) for not providing busing. The board currently spends \$104,000 to provide busing to Georgetown South.

Deligiannis said safety is the key issue. She said the Hungry Hollow bridge is rarely cleared for students in winter and that many students on the west side of town will use Eighth Line, a narrow road without sidewalks, as a shortcut if they have to walk.

"If we don't fight for it, there will be more opportunity for (the board) to push it through," Deligiannis said.

Board chair and Halton Hills Trustee Ethel Gardiner said she will support the continuation of busing.

"I took the motion to the board two years and and it passed but I have no idea how trustees will react given the current financial situation," she said.

Gardiner said Georgetown students don't have the option of public transportation that is available in Oakville and Burlington.

She said transportation is underfunded by the government, with 62 of 72 boards in Ontario spending more on transportation than they were allocated by the government. —By Herb Garbutt, staff writer
