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Win U.S. World Trotting Derby

Ritchie, Andover a Hall of a team

A Halton Hills pairing turned out to be a historic combination.

After equaling the world record mile, Trevor Ritchie of Acton drove

The day didn't start well for Ritchie and Andover Hall as they finished eighth in the day's opening heat after breaking

Andover Hall obviously had a lot left for the second heat, though, setting a blistering pace with fractions of :27.3, :55.3 and 1:24.1. He held off late charges on both sides to defeat Like A Prayer by a neck in world record-matching time of 1:51.3.

"You never expect to go that fast,"
Ritchie said of the record. "I knew by

the fractions that it was a pretty fast mile and then he was strong through the lane. I saw the time come up but I didn't know it was a record until they

announced it."

With two victories needed to claim the World Trotting Derby title, Andover Hall still had some work to do. Andover Hall and Like A Prayer squared off in raceoff to determine the champion. Like A Prayer settled in behind Andover Hall then made his move halfway down the stretch. Again Andover Hall managed to hold off the challenge, winning by a head in 1:54.

Ritchie, who had not driven Andover Hall until two weeks ago, said the horse performed exceptionally.

"This is one of the few races left that tests endurance and speed," Ritchie said. "This is a true championship. It's not just going fast. When you do two heats, or three as we did, only the strong survive."

The victory put an end to Andover Hall's recent misfortunes. The horse missed starts in June due to illness, then as the favourite to win the Hambletonian in August, Andover Hall broke stride after coming into contact with another horse.

"We've had a lot of bad luck lately, but now it's changed," Laakkonen said.
