Building on the success of last year's Festival, this event showcases the talents of first-time directors, actors and production crew. The performers run the gamut from 10 year olds making their stage debut to 77-

year-old Ron Hunt, a veteran with over 100 GLT prod u c t i o n s under his belt!

Four oneact plays will be presented, including:
