Future of local nature reserves watchdog group

Three proposed nature reserves in the Georgetown area may be casualties of changes being considered to a program that provides money to pur-chase and conserve ecologically-significant lands, says an Escarpment watchdog group.

Coalition on the Niagara Escarpment (CONE) reports that land for the nature reserves, totaling approximately 230 acres, may not be able to be purchased due to a change to the provincial government's Ecological Land Acquisition Program (ELAP).

The program provides funds to conservation authorities, and more recently land trusts, to purchase ecologically sensitive lands on the Niagara Escarpment and conserve them as nature reserves.

Three of the properties on the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy's list of properties to purchase include 120 acres on the Fourth Line near Speyside, 15 acres south-east of Terra Cotta Conservation Authority, and a 90-acre property adjacent to Silver Creek Conservation Area.

The province is proposing to expand the






Timberrrrr!
