Task force set up to battle littering

A nanti-littering task force will be set up in Halton Hills. The brainchild of Councillor Jane Fogal, one of the organizers of last spring's Clean-Up Halton Hills Day, the committee will be composed of community volunteers and town councillors. It will work in co-operation with the Community in Blooms committee.

"It spun out of the Clean-Up Halton Hills Day. We did get a huge response from the public and we got a lot of comments that this was great and we needed to clean up," said Fogal. "But those of us who did the cleanup, we saw how quickly the litter came back again— within 24 hours."

Fogal said the task force could perhaps "attack it before it happens."

It has been suggested the task force be combined with the vandalism committee, but Fogal disagreed saying the two issues are separate.

In addition, Councillor Ron Chatten requested the Recreation and Parks Department place garbage cans, used by Communities in Bloom during the summer, in front of the Christ the King High School on both sides of Guelph St., by McDonalds and by the park at Maple Ave.

"If we encourage the kids to use those, and we empty them once a week, they will make a nice addition to the area. We are starting to get litter there," said Chatten.
