




Pricey piece of art

Former Halton Hills resident and artist Richard Berghammer traveled from his home in Elliot Lake to see one of his paintings, owned by the Town of Halton Hills, on display at the Civic Centre. The town held a reception in honour of Berghammer who isselling his personal collection of 62 pieces to a Chinese investor for a total of \$7 million. Berghammer was joined by Halton Hills Mayor Kathy Gastle as they admired the town's painting. Berghammer's work is unique since it's created by painting acrylic on leather. Paintings local residents purchased from Berghammer in the '70s and '80s for less than \$1,000 have now appreciated dramatically in light of the sale of his collection.



The Town of Halton Hills Council will conduct a Public Meeting to examine and discuss a proposed Temporary Use By-law for 12144 Steeles Avenue (south side), also known as Harwood's Horticultural Soil Farm and Nurseries, within the 401 Industrial Corridor as described above and shown on the attached map. The purpose of the application is to permit the Temporary (3-year) use of a horticultural soil farm; and the wholesale and retail sale of nursery and other related landscaping products on this 5.0 ha property (approximately 12.25 acres). The Town's current Official Plan and Zoning By-law (401 Prestige Industrial) do not permit the above mentioned uses.

If you wish to be notified of the Town of Halton Hills Council decision on the proposed Temporary Use By-law, you must make a written request to the Town of Halton Hills at 1 Halton Hills Drive, Georgetown, Ontario L7G 5G2.

If a person or public body that files a notice of appeal of a decision of the Town of Halton Hills in respect of the proposed Temporary Use By-law does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Halton Hills before the proposed Temporary By-law is adopted, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss all or part of the appeal(s).
