## Commission to hear proposal to amend Escarpment plan

A n application to amend the Niagara Escarpment Plan by Dufferin Aggregates will be considered by the Niagara Escarpment Commission (NEC) at a meeting at the Civic Centre tomorrow (Thursday).

Approximately 30 people have registered to speak at the meeting to be held in the council chambers.

Richard Murzin, a NEC spokesperson, said the business section of the meeting will start at 9:30 a.m., and the Dufferin application is to be dealt with beginning at 10 a.m.

Dufferin Aggregates, which has operated its quarry from its Milton site

since 1962, wants to expand its operation and is seeking to re-designate a total of 205 acres for mineral extraction production. Of that, 169.5 acres is located within the Niagara Escarpment Plan Escarpment Rural Area designation.

NEC staff is recommending that the NEP amendment not be approved and key issues are the perpetual operation of the water management system, the loss of corridors and linkages and the impact on the substantially continuous natural environment of lands in the vicinity of the Niagara Escarpment.

NEC staff has alternatively recommended that the NEC may consider that, because of a number of factors, the application is justified and can be approved.

If the NEC does approve the application however, staff recommends several conditions should be considered for adoption including the removal of the wetlands/Jefferson Salamander breeding site from the licence and identification of an appropriate buffer area.

Staff also recommends that the necessary agreements be put into place to manage, monitor and maintain the water management system over the long term at no cost to the public.

Halton Region and the towns of

Halton Hills and Milton have approved in principle all applications necessary for the licensing of the lands for mineral extraction with conditions.

Those conditions include that the wetlands and Jefferson Salamander breeding sites in Halton Hills and a small portion of a provincially significant Area of Natural and Scientific Interest in Milton and appropriate buffer area be excluded from the proposed licence.

Conditions also deal with the longterm operation of the water management system and groundwater management.






