The Atom Raiders looked to have Georgetown's first Earlybird championship wrapped up when Chris Taylor scored twice to spot his team a 2-0 lead in the final. However, Sault Ste. Marie fought back with a goal late in the second and added two more in the third to steal a 3-2 victory.

Kyle Ward got the Raiders off to a good start, posting a shutout in their first game of the tournament but he was matched by his Markham counterpart in a scoreless tie.

The Raiders posted another shutout in the second game, blanking Ancaster 2-0. Jean-Phillippe Villeneuve and Todd Bannerman scored, both set up by Taylor. The Raiders continued their winning ways with a 5-1 victory over Simcoe. Patrick Kennedy and Taylor each scored twice and Ryan Brazeau added another. Matthew Weber and Matthew Quinn each had two assists.

The Raiders posted their third shutout of the tournament in a 4-0 triumph over Uxbridge. Quinn, Weber, Jeff Beedham and Taylor scored and Villeneuve picked up a pair of assists.

After posting a 2-1-1 record in the round robin, the Novice Raiders advanced to the semifinals.

Facing Brampton, which had trounced the Raiders 10-2 earlier in the tournament, Georgetown entered the final period down 1-0. Three goals in the first five minutes of the third extended that lead to 4-0 but the Raiders did not fold. Instead, Derek Thomas scored with 5:18 to play to break the shutout.

A minute and 40 seconds later, Bryson Nicolucci and Conor McGucken had cut the lead to 4-3. Brampton would hold off the charging Raiders, though, and went on to win the championship over Aurora.

Tyler Topham scored twice in a 6-1 win over Milton to open the tournament. Nicolucci had a goal and two assists and Jordan Brown, McGucken and Adam MacKinnon had the other goals.

Thomas and Paul Chiapetta scored in the loss to Brampton but the Raiders bounced back to down Aurora 3-1. Brett Gresswell, MacKinnon and Topham scored for the Raiders and Connor Brown had two assists.

Nicolucci's third-period goal gave the Raiders a 2-2 tie with Caledon in their final round-robin game. MacKinnon had the other goal.

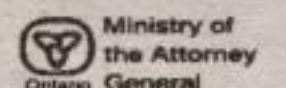
