since the team's last practice.


"It's been difficult at times," Remenda said. "He's explained things on the board and we've picked up a lot of the stuff but we really haven't

Chargers fall in final

J.J. James prevented a Halton Hills sweep at the Charger Ram Tough Invitational Volleyball Tournament.

The Oakville school defeated the hosts, Centennial Chargers, 25-15 in the boys final of Saturday's tournament. Twenty-four teams—12 boys and 12 girls—competed at the tournament at Georgetown District High School.

Centennial had rolled through pool play with a perfect 10-0 record and then defeated Stewarttown 25-10 in the semifinals.

Stewarttown and Centennial also met in the girls' semifinal. Stewarttown evened the score between the schools with a narrow 25-22 victory. Stewarttown then went on to defeat Oakville's Rolling Meadows in the final.

New-look Rebels still strong...

It may be a rebuilding year but the Georgetown Rebels are by no means starting from the ground floor.

The volleyball Rebels improved to 4-0 on the season with a 25-21, 25-18 victory over Acton, a win that moved them into sole possession of first place in Halton. Province-wide, the Rebels are ranked fifth in a *Toronto Star* poll.

Both are quite an accomplishment considering the turnover on the Rebels.

Two senior players eligible to return did not play so they could concentrate on their studies. Same goes for a pair of junior players who were to move up to the senior team. That left just four players— Kyle Hall, Chris Cavasin, Reid Hall and Ryan Humberstone— returning from last year's squad.

Although it has yet to win a tournament, Georgetown has had strong showings against top caliber teams. They took Essex-Kent, the province's top-ranked team, to three games before losing.

"We've been hanging in there but we've been losing games in the last five to seven points," said Rebel coach Jonas Kaciulis.

The Rebels, who have been to three straight Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association (OFSAA) tournaments, usually have a veteran-laden team. But with four players opting not to play, they had to reach deep into the junior ranks. Grade 9 students Gavin Viray-Cox and Nick Turnout are both taking on significant roles on the senior squad. Kaciulis said the ability for both to step into the senior lineup is a tribute to the training they've had in elementary school.

"There were a couple more on the junior team that could have played for us but we didn't want to raid their entire team," Kaciulis said.

So far, things have worked out for both teams with the juniors sporting a 5-1 record.

The only down side to the Rebels youth is that the team is much smaller than the top teams. But he said his team compensates with a never-say-die attitude that is evident in their defensive play.

Though Kaciulis said OFSAA is an attainable goal, especially with two GHAC berths in the tournament, he said a medal may be a year or two away.

"We have a strong young team and we have a good team atmosphere," Kaciulis said. "We're close but the other top teams have tremendous size advantage on us."

Still, Kaciulis didn't expect the team to be as strong as it is, so he's not ruling out his team surprising him once again.
