A Proposed Temporary Use - By-law
For 9646 Highway No. 7
Part of East Half of Lot 27 Concession 4
Town of Halton Hills (Esquesing)
File: D14/H1 (9646 Highway No. 7)

The Town of Halton Hills Council will conduct a Public meeting to examine and discuss a proposed Temporary Use By-law for 9646 Highway No. 7 (south side). This 40.4 ha (100 acre) Rural Area property is generally located east of the Acton Urban Area at the south west intersection of Highway No. 7 and the Fourth Line within the Rural Cluster of Bannockburn as described above and shown on the attached map.

The application is to permit the Temporary (3-year) use of the site as a golf driving range.


The subject property is currently zoned (H) C2-1 (Holding - Highway Commercial Special), (H) RE-1 (Holding - Estate Residential Special), (H) OS2-1 (Holding - Inherent Hazard lands Special), and RU (Rural) under By-law 74-51, as amended. A draft approved 13-lot Rural Estate Plan of Subdivision (File 24T-91008/H) is still in effect on these lands. A portion of the site is located in the 'Niagara Escarpment Development Control Area' but outside the Niagara Escarpment Plan area.

If you wish to be notified of the Town of Halton Hills Council decision on the proposed Temporary Use By-law, you must make a written request to the Town of Halton Hills at 1 Halton Hills Drive, Georgetown, Ontario L7G 5G2.

If a person or public body that files a notice of appeal of a decision of the Town of Halton Hills in respect of the proposed Temporary Use By-law does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Halton Hills before the proposed Temporary Use By-law is adopted, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss all or part of the appeal(s).


The silent auction will feature numerous great gift items, including Christmas crafts, sports items, a shopping spree and a trip to Ottawa.

"This year's Harvest Fest is in aid of the GDHS Parent Partners in Education (PPEd) to raise money for library resources at the high school," said Kiwanis past president Brett Worby, "Every year, we use Harvest Fest proceeds to aid a group in town, and this year we've chosen the PPEd."

Past recipients of Harvest Fest include local motion, Halton Hills Community Support and Information, Georgetown Globe Productions and Georgetown Little Theatre.

Tickets are \$50 each, and Worby says organizers are encouraging people to buy a table of eight, since the PPEd has also taken the approach of treating this event as a reunion, encouraging GDHS alumni to get involved, as well as renew old friendships.

Monies raised by the event will directly aid the library resources at GDHS. Thousands of dollars of books at the school library need to be replaced because they have obsolete, and the PPEd is hoping to eventually update the facilities with new

A second place prize went to Alex Burns of Georgetown and his Shad Valley team at the RBC/Shad Entrepreneurship Cup.

Shad Valley is a Canadian program that links high school students with universities and businesses in a summer experience combining leadership and learning skills with entrepreneurship, science, and innovation projects.

Burns had attended a Shad Valley program at

the University of New Brunswick last summer and developed with other teens Exantlo, a modified exhaust system that will reduce gas emissions. The team won second place for their business plan and was also featured on a Discovery channel television program. The overall top prize went to the McMaster University team for its product, Big Green Tree Planting Kit.
