## Well water

The leaky faucet that has been dripping bad public relations for the provincial government since the E. coli disaster in Walkerton is going to be shut off by Ernie Eves' government. Or so the premier hopes.

Eves and Environment Minister Chris Stockwell announced last week the Conservative government is introducing legislation

to better protect Ontario's drinking water.

The Safe Water Drinking Act, said Eves, takes into account the recommendations made last January by Dennis R. O'Connor in his official report on the E. coli disaster that killed seven people in 2000 in Walkerton.

If passed, the proposed act will mandate licensing and accreditation for all drinking water testing laboratories, ensure all operators of drinking water systems are certified and appoint a chief inspector to oversee inspection policies, training of ministry inspectors and frequency of inspections and annual reporting.


Eves says his government consulted with the public and various stakeholders in drafting the proposed legislation and will continue to do so as it's sent to government committee this fall. Those who want to get involved should contact their MPP.

While Eves claims the crux of the proposed act stems from O'Connor's report, the proposed rule changes contained within it seem based on common sense.

Water testing facilities should be licensed, all inspectors should be certified and there most definitely needs to be a hierarchy in place to ensure the summer Walkerton experienced two years ago is never repeated.

There's little chance the public will tolerate even one more death caused by someone sipping a cup of tap water.

Nor should they.

Despite raising concerns with safety (no sidewalks, dangerous shortcuts, walking along a busy Highway 7 thoroughfare, etc.) and the wellness of students (distance, time, effort, weather), the Halton Catholic District School Board declined to provide busing for Georgetown West.

The rationale for their decision was that they did not want to set a precedent for other municipalities. By approving busing for Georgetown South, which is considerably closer to Christ the King, wasn't a precedent already set? Or is the board only interested in protecting the interests of those who provide them with the largest tax base? Shouldn't all students residing in Georgetown have the same right to services?

Furthermore, students in other municipalities in Halton have the option to use city busing or more

frequent GO bus service. These options are not available to the students in our community.

Although the Acton bus currently passes by Georgetown West at less than full capacity, we have been told that the board would have to approve an additional bus

It is our understanding, through conversations with the board staff that there is not enough money in the current budget to meet all transportation needs. Certainly, higher transportation costs should have been anticipated when the board decided to build a school in a primarily industrial area.
