Rebels be-Deviled in senior semifinal

For four straight years, the Georgetown District High School Rebels have been virtually unbeatable.

Since 1998— the last time the Rebels did not make the Halton final— the team had posted a record of 40-2 in league play. Even this season— as close to a rebuilding year as the Rebels have seen in years— Georgetown went undefeated.

Thursday, they became victims of the lofty expectations that come with the success they've experienced when the Oakville-Trafalgar Red Devils edged the Rebels 25-22, 25-21 in the Halton senior boys volley-ball semifinal.

Most senior teams with two Grade 9 starters and four players unexpectedly taking the year off would not even consider a league championship to be in their grasp. Yet, that's what the Rebels set out to do.

All seemed to be going according to plan until an unexpected semifinal matchup against O-T, who joined the Rebels at the Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association (OFSAA) championship last year.

O-T should have been reserved for the final if not for a loss earlier in the year in which they were missing almost every starter. That loss dropped them to second in their division, linking them up with the Rebels, the first-place finisher in the league's other division.

"Experience was the determining factor," said Rebel coach Jonas Kaciulis. "I'm happy with the way we fought."

The Rebels, though never more than a few points back, trailed throughout most of the opening game. The roles were reversed in the second game with the Rebels leading much of the way. However, some uncharacteristic mistakes by the Rebels let O-T take a 22-18 lead. With too few points left to play with, the Rebels could not come back.

"We might have been too up for the game," Kaciulis said. "Sometimes you have so much energy you try to hold back a little and start to second-guess yourself."

The Rebels will have two holes to fill in the starting lineup next year with the departure of Chris Cavasin and Kyle Hall. Their leadership will also be missed.

"Those guys deserve so much credit for bringing along the young guys," Kaciulis said."They took them and made them part of the family. It really took the pressure off of them. They're two of the best to come through this gym."

The Rebel coach said the team will also miss the versatility of their third graduating player, Ryan Humberstone.

"He was always looking to add to the team in any, way he could. He was always ready when he was called upon."
