## Holy Cross CWL observes 50th anniversary

Read and anticipation abound at Holy Cross parish as the Catholic Women's League (CWL) prepares for its 50th Jubilee this fall.

To mark this important occasion, the Most Reverend A.F. Tonnos, Bishop of Hamilton Diocese, will celebrate mass on Saturday, Nov. 16, followed by a banquet in the church hall.

The CWL at Holy Cross was organized and received its charter in 1952 with 15 members. Since then membership has grown to 174. Beth Yates was the first president and she, Margaret Wilcox and Teresa Lawr are the only surviving charter members.

It is anticipated that many pastpresidents from as far away as Florida and South Carolina will attend the anniversary celebration.

The CWL's mandate includes fund-raising for parish and community projects and for foreign relief. The major fund-raiser is an annual bazaar held in October. In years past, the bazaar was held in the Rose Room above the Memorial Arena on Mill St. When Holy Cross Church was built in 1965, this event was


moved to the church hall.

The CWL is a national organization with more than 104,000 members. The national executive, based in Winnipeg, meets annually with federal ministers to suggest policies

that members have formulated. The CWL was the first to urge a ban on the manufacture and sale of land mines as well as mounting a campaign against child pornography among many other endeavours.
