
Landau is promotions manager for Vibe Radio, the student-run radio station at the University of Toronto, Mississauga campus where she is a full-time student.


Mike Lawrence and Andrew Landau were stage managers. "They worked hard to produce a smooth show that had only five minute breaks between performances," said Jasmine Landau.




