

Bantam girls squad captures national youth bowling crown

The start may not have been what they wanted but the finish was L everything they wished for.

After losing the first two games, the Georgetown Bowl bantam girls won 17 of 19 games to claim the Youth Bowling Council national championship in Regina Monday. Kaylyn Pshyk, Brittany Hole, Chelsea Parent, Erika Heissler and Megan Webster put an emphatic stamp on their victory by closing with the two highest scores of the tournament— a 970 that clinched the title followed by a 1,061 that left little doubt as to which was the best team.

"They all bowled great," said coach Wendy Parent. "It was a true team effort. When one was up another was down and when one was down the other was up."

Georgetown took control with a threegame sweep of British Columbia, which led 12-11 until that point. Georgetown evened things up with a convincing 820-719 victory in the first game and moved in front by taking the second game by 64 pins.

British Columbia looked as though it would pull even in the final game but Georgetown rallied in the final frame to pull out an 858-849 win and carry a 14-12 lead into its last match against Northern Ontario. Georgetown needed just two wins to clinch first and took the opening game by 124 pins. A dominating 236-pin win in the second game sealed their status as national champions.

"I knew when we went we had a good shot," Parent said. "B.C. had the best scores going in but I knew they had it in them. They really gelled as a team."

The coach's faith never wavered even when Newfoundland, which won the bronze, took the first two games in Georgetown's opening match.

"Early in the match it's all very overwhelming being at nationals. It took them a couple of games to settle into the competi-

Georgetown turned in scores of 765 and 747 in those first two games but would only dip under the 800-mark one more time in the final 19 games. The team finished with the tournament's highest average, 853.

Pshyk's 195.36 was the tournament's best individual average while Parent's 189.81 was second and Hole's 179.95 was fourth. Webster and Heissler also delivered clutch performances. Webster bowled a 210 in the title clinching game and followed it up with a 204 in the final game. Heissler delivered a 195 in the second game against British Columbia and a 232 in the team's last game.
