

Quarterly report shows Town's water is up to standards

Talton Hills' drinking water has met Ontario's quality standards between January and March.
Halton Region released its water quality

report for the first quarter of 2003 last week.

"It (the report) demonstrates that Halton has a system in place that works," said Patrick Murphy, Halton Region's Commissioner of Planning and Public Works. "And it shows that we are consistently meeting or doing better than provincial water quality standards."

Water in both Acton and Georgetown are monitored and sampled daily by region staff, working out of the Georgetown Water Purification Plant, located in

Cedarvale Park.

Testing at Acton's five wells failed to meet Ontario's standards only once. On Feb. 21, plant staff reported a treated well sample with a turbidity spike that was attributed to a malfunctioning analyzer sensor. It was replaced.

Turbidity indicates the presence of natu-

rally occurring particles in the groundwater source.

Halton Region will also continue to monitor chlorine residuals in Acton this year, after swabbing the lines and installing bleeders into the Lakeview subdivision to keep the water moving last year.

In Georgetown, on March 31, staff reported a well sample with a fluoride spike. Once again this was attributed to malfunctioning equipment, which was replaced. Fluoride is added to town water to prevent tooth decay.

Georgetown's nine wells serve Georgetown, Glen Williams, Norval and Stewarttown

Talton Hills students claimed 15 medals, including four gold, at the Halton Skills Olympics.


Acton High School's Bryan Rauwerda and Greg Demand each won gold. Rauwerda won in the architectural CADD division while Demand took first in mechanical CADD.

Prom dresses/suits needed


Anyone with a prom/grad dress or suit cluttering their closet can donate the attire to someone who may have to miss their prom.
