

School board to adopt balanced school day

The Halton District School Its balanced day timetable in most elementary schools this fall, despite the concerns of some trustees.

Board staff informed trustees at last week's public committee meeting that, after reviewing the results and feedback from a pilot project, it had decided to go with the new school schedule.

The balanced day, as it is called, provides three 100-minute blocks of instructional time daily divided by two nutrition breaks of 40 and 50 minutes each, one of which is to be deemed a lunch period.

The current, traditional school timetable consists of the mandated 300 minutes of instructional time with two recess breaks of 15 minutes and a lunch break of up to one hour.

Those exempt from the new schedule will be youngsters in half-day, everyday Junior and Senior Kindergarten classes.

Education director Dusty Papke noted at the board meeting that high schools, by their nature, cannot employ a balanced day schedule.


Eight public schools in Halton Board is going ahead with have taken part in the board's balanced day pilot project since the start of the 2002-03 school year including George Kennedy and Park Public Schools in Georgetown.

> Proponents of the new schedule believe the major benefits to students and staff are longer, uninterrupted blocks of teaching time and the two substantial breaks each day for general exercise and intramural games as well as staff communication.

> On the negative side, board officials have noted there may be difficulties in co-ordinating the timing of half-day staff professional development opportunities, scheduling part-time employees, getting parents/students to pack two snacks per day instead of one, and arranging office schedules in single-secretary schools.

> Several trustees expressed a variety of concerns about the balanced day. Some doubting parents in the audience at the board meeting could be heard mumbling derisive comments about some of the answers given by board staff.
