NOTICE OF A SECOND PUBLIC MEETING

WARD 3/North side of Guelph Street,
west of Mountainview Road and east of
Maple Avenue, Blocks 14 and 15,
Registered Plan 20M-746,
Town of Halton Hills (Georgetown)

(Loblaw Properties Limited)

Council for the Town of Halton Hills will conduct a second Public Meeting to examine and discuss proposed amendments to the Official Plan and Zoning By-law to permit the development of a single building supermarket having traditional supermarket elements as well as a range of non-conventional "plus department" uses. A separate gas bar is also proposed.

The first Public Meeting was held on July 14, 2003. In conjunction with that meeting receipt of comments was requested by July 31, 2003. The second Public Meeting will provide additional opportunity for public input. All comments received will be given consideration by staff and Council.

The subject property is a 4.15 hectare vacant parcel of land located in Georgetown and legally described as Blocks 14 and 15, Registered Plan 20M-746. The property has frontage on both Guelph Street and Mountainview Road and is located east of Maple Avenue. Immediately abutting to the northwest is Christ the King Secondary School. Immediately east of the property are located a restaurant, a financial institution and a gas station. A key map showing the location of the subject property is attached.

The subject property is currently designated Special Mixed Use Node in the Official Plan. The proposed amendment to the Official Plan would have the effect of adding a gas bar as one of the range of permitted uses within the Mixed Use Node whereas such use is specifically excluded in the current Official Plan. In addition, the proposed amendment to the Official Plan would have the effect of increasing the allowable maximum gross leasable floor area of a supermarket, including non-food departments, to 12,830 m² whereas the current Official Plan permits a supermarket and an accessory outdoor garden centre to a maximum gross leasable floor area not to exceed 5,109.5 m².

The proposed amendment to the Zoning By-law would have the effect of revising the General Commercial zoning on the subject property to retain the uses currently permitted on the property, add a gas bar associated with a supermarket as a permitted use, amend the definition of a 'Supermarket' to accommodate an increase in the allowable maximum gross floor area to 12,830 m², not including the outdoor garden centre, and to allow non-food retail uses, private recreation, services uses and a financial institution. Access to the site is proposed via Guelph Street and Mountainview Road. A Traffic Impact Study, a Supermarket Impact Analysis and a Land Use Justification Analysis have been submitted in support of the applications.


If you wish to be notified of the adoption of the proposed Official Plan Amendment and/or if you wish to be notified of the decision of the Town of Halton Hills in respect of this proposed zoning by-law amendment, you must make a written request to the Town of Halton Hills, 1 Halton Hills Drive, Halton Hills (Georgetown), Ontario L7G 5G2.

If a person or public body that files a notice of appeal of a decision of the Town of Halton Hills in respect of the proposed Official Plan Amendment does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Halton Hills before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss all or part of the appeal.

If a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of the Town of Halton Hills in respect of the proposed Zoning By-law does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Halton Hills before the proposed Zoning By-law is adopted, the Ontario Municipal Board may dismiss all or part of the appeal.

Upcoming Acton Fall Fair will see increased police presence— chief

There will be an increased police presence at the Acton and Milton Fall Fairs says Halton Police Chief Ean Algar.

"I'd like to put out the message to the youth that we will be there and we will be out there in presence. To those who plan to be mischievous or misbehave, it will not be tolerated."

Algar also said "steps will have to be taken in the future to respond to this."

But Charles St. residents at a council meeting Monday wanted to know why there wasn't already action taken. Two years ago, five teens were arrested when fights broke out as the fair closed for the night.

"Were we not prepared in any shape or form for this type of scenario?," asked Burke Metcalfe. "We're not a small town anymore and this type of thing is going to happen."

"There has to be a proactive way to pre-

vent this whether it comes down to simply checking backpacks," said Thomas Trotter. "I was amazed that all these kids all of a sudden at 11 p.m. were coming up with bottles and cans of beers (from their backpacks)."

Halton Hills Mayor Kathy Gastle said the town will wait for the police to come up with a plan to prevent future incidents.

"I would like to rely on the professionals at Halton Regional Police to bring the recommendations to us because they are the experts. I'm confident that will be done as soon as they can finish their review of the whole incident."

Councillor Moya Johnson said drinking at the fairgrounds is a problem that is not just confined to the fair.

The Acton Fair is set for Sept. 19-21.

Even the biggest variable for the fair— the weather— cooperated throughout the weekend.


"It was fantastic weather-wise," Nurse said. "Last year it was too hot. It was 110 (Fahrenheit)
