Legions fail in bid for immediate exemptions

No changes to the smoking bylaw until 2004

Talton Hills councillors sidestepped making a decision on re-opening L the smoking bylaw before the municipal elections, by delaying a decision until early 2004.

Earlier this month, Acton Legion requested the town change the bylaw, which was approved earlier this year, to give its private club an exemption, but instead councillors deferred a Councillor Dobbie Frizzell motion that called for that exemption to Monday's

The town's two legions both had exemptions under the old bylaw, but were forced to comply with the new bylaw that allows smok-

ing only after 9 p.m. A 100 per cent smoking ban in all public and private places is expected to go into place on July 1, 2004.

Acton Legion, with Georgetown Legion writing a letter, protested at council that this bylaw was creating a financial hardship for the organization as its members were going to neighbouring community legions that allowed smoking.

On Monday, before a public debate, councillors retreated to an in-camera meeting at the request of Mayor Kathy Gastle. Upon their return Frizzell immediately withdrew his motion. Gastle then introduced a motion that council consider an exemption for private

clubs and that staff report back on the possibility of legal challenges.

Clerk Karen Landry said, due to the workload generated by the municipal elections, it is likely staff wouldn't be able to report back until early 2004.

All councillors approved the motion, with exception of Councillors Moya Johnson, Jane Fogal and Joan Robson.

"I think when we went through this smoking bylaw it was a hard-fought battle ... I think we should give it some time for people to get used to it. ... To make exemptions, just creates an unlevel playing field," said Johnson.
