Town, regional officials celebrate introduction of 'Big Pipe' to corridor

Paving the way for further industrial development, Halton Region and both Milton and Halton Hills elected officials were on hand to celebrate the introduction of the 'Big Pipe' to the 401 Corridor Tuesday afternoon.

"More than 500 acres of employment lands will be developed in the 401 corridor in Halton Hills and Milton over the next 10 years," said Halton Regional Chairman Joyce Savoline at the groundbreaking held at the Halton Region Northern Operations Centre on Steeles Ave. "Thanks to the ongoing support of the Halton Regional Council and the partnership between the region and the municipalities, we are positioned to attract new industry to Halton and encourage professionals and skilled workers to live and work here."

Halton Hills Mayor Kathy Gastle said she was "very proud of what we've accomplished."

"This is a wonderful opportunity to realize our economic development potential. The Halton Hills 401 Industrial Corridor, which forms part of the 401/407 Gateway Industrial Park, is a prime location for businesses. Thanks to the region and the Halton municipalities we can now capitalize on many economic opportunities," said Gastle.

Milton Mayor Gord Krantz called the

land in the Corridor the "most excellent industrial property anywhere in Ontario."

"Provision of servicing means that we can continue our very successful economic development program in Milton," said Krantz. "We are thrilled with the level of commitment from the region and the local developers who were instrumental in getting this project up and running."

Providing water and wastewater services to the Corridor is a key component of the Halton Urban Structure Plan, which was adopted by Regional Council in 1999.

Halton Region will be constructing 4.4 km of water main westerly along James Snow Parkway to accommodate the Milton Business Park, and along Steeles Ave. to introduce services in that area.

Construction in Milton is to begin in November and to be completed by next June. Construction in Halton Hills is to start following the tender process next January, with completion slated for next June.

Halton Region is front-ending the total cost of the \$14.3 million project, which includes construction of a new pumping station to accommodate the servicing in Halton Hills, through the issuance of debt. Debt charges are to be recovered through the collection of future development charges.
