Georgetown bookkeeper charged after nursing home, patient defrauded

Georgetown bookkeeper at a Brampton nursing home has been charged with defrauding the home and an elderly resident she befriended of a substantial amount of money.

A 90-year-old woman at Tullamore Nursing Home on Kennedy Road S. signed blank cheques, which were cashed for a substantial amount of money between October 2002 and last March, Victory Cr. according to Peel Police.

Some nursing home cheques were also deposited into a private bank account, according to police.

Peel police Fraud Bureau investigators arrested the woman Wednesday.

Isabel Filiti, 40, of Georgetown, has been charged with fraud over \$5,000.

Halton Police are investigating several break-ins at the South Georgetown Centre on Mountainview Rd. that occurred about 5:30 a.m. Monday.

Police report cash was taken from the Factory Outlet Dry Cleaners after the front door was smashed to gain entry into the store. Police say cash was also taken from First Choice Haircutters, which was entered through a pried open rear door.

Johnson Associates was also entered through the wall in First Choice's storage room. Nothing was taken but damage to the wall is estimated at \$1,000.

Police report someone also attempted to enter Shoppers Drug Mart in the plaza through the roof, but was unsuccessful, so blocks from the roof were thrown down to

the ground and used to try to break the knob on the rear door. That attempt was also unsuccessful.

A Mississauga man was charged with impaired driving and having over 80 mg of alcohol in 100 ml of blood after police stopped a vehicle on Guelph St. Saturday evening.




