## Train buff likes plans for station


Dear editor,

I was very pleased to read the news item in The Independent & Free Press August 6, Chamber is eyeing train station to be new home on land at Dominion Gardens, as the former Brampton Canadian Pacific railway station needs a new home.

The architectural design of the former station is fairly significant as the building is of Type 10 design, with a design twist. For some reason, probably due to growing economic demands in Brampton at the turn of the last century, the freight section was built larger than normal Type 10 designs. To date, two examples of the station type are still in use in Ontario in Galt and in Mattawa. Also, a few former Type 10 designed station buildings, are now "recycled" into homes and business-

Best wishes to the Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce with their possible plans to use the former railway station for offices and as a tourism information centre, as a number of chambers, throughout Ontario, have converted former railway stations into offices, tourist information centres, etc.
