Police believe break-ins related

Halton Police are investigating several rural break-ins they believe are related that occurred over the weekend.

Cash, a purse, and a 1999 Ford Taurus valued at \$10,000 were stolen from a Sixth Line home late Saturday or early Sunday after someone entered the house through an unlocked door while the residents were sleeping.

Also late Saturday or early Sunday police report a home on the Fourth Line was entered through an unlocked side door. A digital camera and cash were taken.

At approximately the same time, police report a purse was stolen from a Steeles Ave. home while the residents slept. Entry was gained through a kitchen window.

Also, police report at approximately 4:30 a.m. a Sixth Line resident received a call from a neighbour who told her about a break-in at her home. The resident got up and noticed that the side door in her home was open, but nothing had been taken.

Police also report another Sixth Line resident was awakened by a loud crash in her living room. She went to investigate and found the living room window open, but no one had entered the home.

Police received information on vehicles possibly connected with the break-ins. One is described as a compact car and the other vehicle is described as a light-coloured Ford Explorer, or similar-type vehicle.

Halton Police are investigating an assault against a male Georgetown youth in connection with a disturbance involving a number of youths that occurred outside Georgetown Cinema Friday evening.

A Brampton man was charged after Halton Police saw a man get into a vehicle and start the engine on Guelph St. early Friday. Charged with having over 80 mg of alcohol in 100 ml of blood is Robert Kostenko, 19, of Porteous Cr., Brampton.

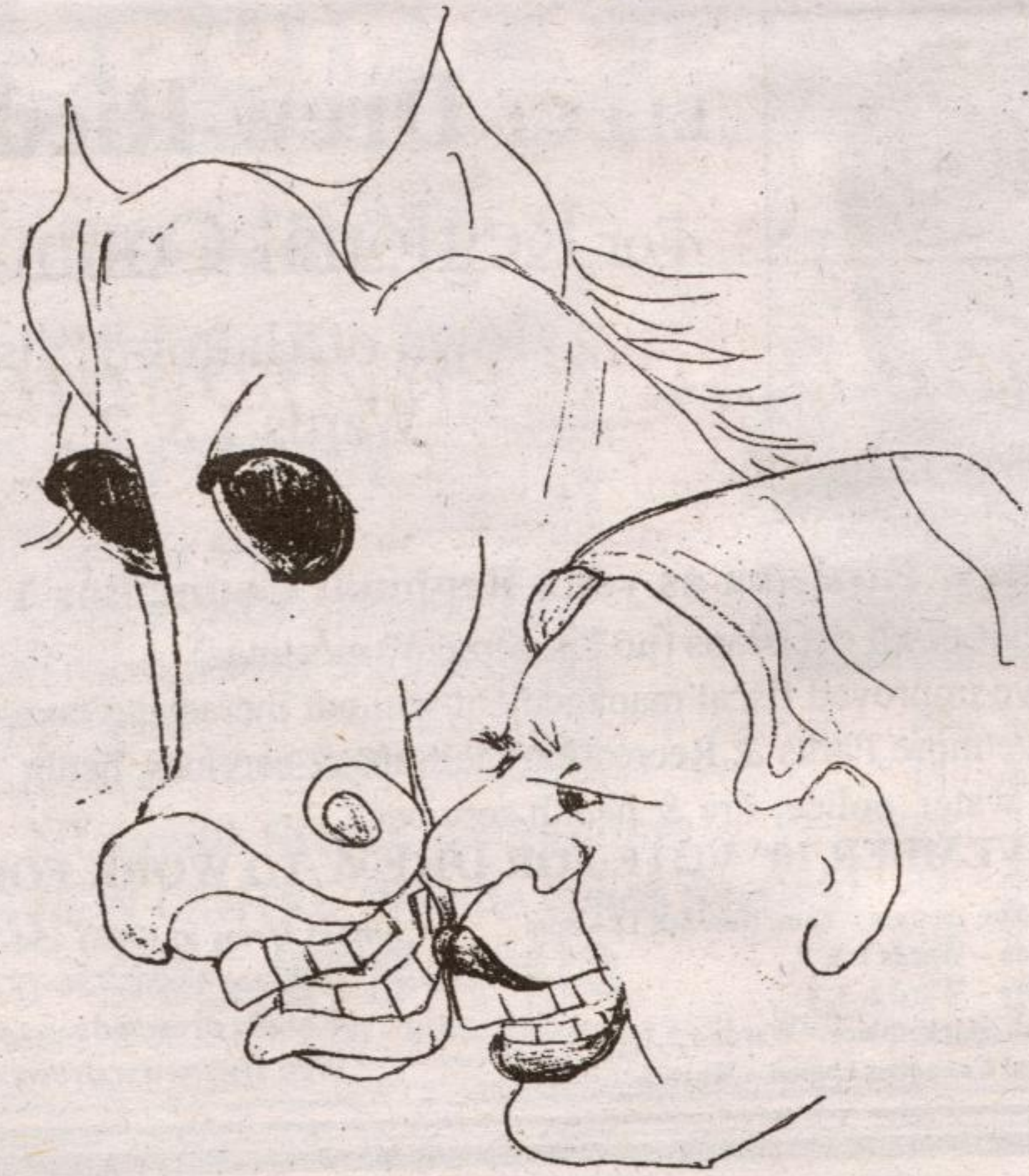
Police report approximately \$1,000 damage was caused to a 2003 GMC Sierra parked at a John St. home when it was spray-painted late Saturday or early Sunday.

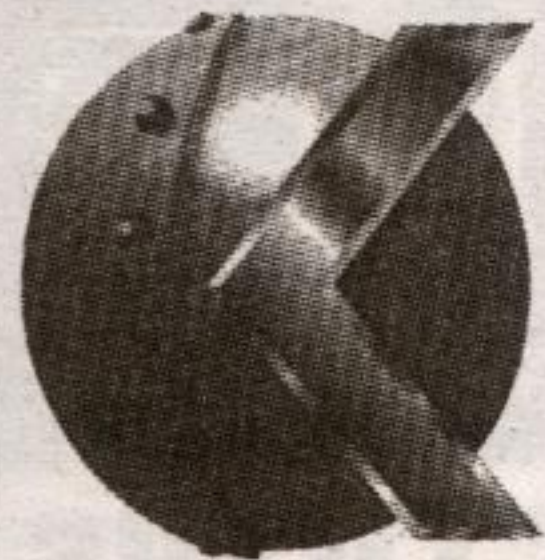
