## The niece who never forgot...

Sixty years after her uncle was killed in action, Lynda Paul finds 'closure' in a Dutch cemetery

he night was clear May 4,1943, as 14 Halifax bombers lifted off from the airfield near Pockington, Yorkshire, England.

The mission was a night bombing raid targeting a steel mill complex located in Dortmund, Germany. The raid was part of a campaign to cut off steel resources thereby crippling the Nazi war machine as it rolled across Europe.


As part of the 102nd (Ceylon) Squadron of the Royal Air Force (RAF), squadron records show

records show
the North Sea crossing for the 14 aircraft was uneventful, with a clear
night in front of those bombers
loaded down with 500 lb. bombs, en
route to their objective in Germany.

It's impossible to know what was going through the minds of the seven crew members in bomber HR 667 DY-O as they set off on that mission. Some were veteran airmen, having flown numerous such raids, while others were not so experi-

enced.

The rear gunner, 20 year-old Flight Sergeant Kenneth Howard Buck, was the only Canadian on board that night. On loan from the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF), F/Sgt Buck was already a veteran of numerous bombing raids, in spite of his relatively young age. He'd seen his fair share of action already, being the lone survivor in an earlier air crash in which he had suffered major injuries. Born on
