Gastle, who congratulated the new mayor and councillors, said her years as mayor were "the best three years of my life."


"I have enjoyed the opportunity to be in public service, in office for the Town of Halton Hills, for the past 12 years," said Gastle.

She said she worked hard during the cam-


paign and knocked on many doors.

# Region chair: Savoline wins big

It's not broken, so don't fix it. That was the message sent Monday by voters in Halton in selecting incumbent Joyce Savoline to her fourth consecutive term as regional chair.

The veteran politician from Burlington earned 62 per cent of Monday's votes and will maintain the title for another three years.

Savoline's 41,800 total votes easily beat out second-place finisher Brian Burton of Oakville who captured 12,555 votes. Neither Burlington's Anne Marsden nor Robert Heaton of Halton Hills factored into the race. Marsden picked up 7,919 votes, while Heaton received 4,660.

Savoline said voters can expect her to continue to advocate for good governance, especially in areas like development and environmental protection.

"We're not going to let the quality of life slip in our communities it's something that we work very hard to achieve," she said.

Savoline, 58, said she thinks much of the good work done by regional council goes unnoticed because it doesn't adopt an in-yourface brand of governance.

She said Halton's 400,000 residents can expect improved communication between the government and citizenry.

Second-place finisher Burton, whose campaign focused significantly on development issues said he expected a better result.

"I'm very disappointed. I didn't expect to win but I thought I would do better than I did," he said.

Marsden declined to comment, while Heaton could not be reached for comment.
