


Bigg finished the race in 17 minutes while McClure was four seconds back in 45th.

Bigg led the Halton/GHAC race from start to finish, opening up a lead of as much as 20 seconds.

"Melissa improved a lot this year. She had never beaten Sadie (until the Halton/GHAC race) or the two girls who finished second and third," Adams said.

"She was able to stretch out her lead and force the other kids to try to reel her in," Adams said.

While her opponents used up their energy trying to catch her, which they eventually did, Bigg had enough left for a strong kick over the final 400m to pull away again.

Acton's Ashton Roza and Sanford Mick finished third and sixth in the Halton/GHAC junior race and would have qualified for OFSAA but were disqualified because of a change in age requirements. The 15-yearolds both raced in midget last year but under changes which moved the age requirement by four monthswould have had to race in senior this year.

An Open Letter to Halton Residents and Friends and Family of Allendale Long-Term Care Facility:

Recently you may have read media coverage or heard about Halton's plan to move to an 'alternative service delivery' approach at Allendale, Halton Region's long term care facility in Milton. There has been some innaccuracy about these plans, which is creating undo angst and stress for the residents and families of Allendale. Halton Region would like to set the record straight.

At Halton, we believe strongly in long-term care. Halton Region is currently building two new facilities in Oakville and Burlington respectively, and plans are being made to bring these two facilities on board at the end of next year as publicly funded, operated and managed long-term care centers. It is a matter of public record that approximately 180 - 200 new positions will be required for our expanded commitment to long-term care.

As part of our normal business practice and in preparing to transition to these two new additional long-term care facilities, the decision was made to have hairdressing and foot care provided by outside service providers. The same level of service will continue to be provided on Allendale premises. This approach has been successfully implemented in many other long-term care facilities with no adverse impact on residents.

The four unionized employees who are affected by the change to foot care and hairdressing services are being offered all possible options under their collective agreement of remaining with Halton, including retraining and necessary support during the transition.

With respect to the delivery of non-care related functions, no decision has been made. You can be assured that these services will be reviewed and considered with input from staff, residents and families, and will be communicated in a timely way over the next several months.

I wish to assure you that I would never put forward any change that would compromise the care of the most vulnerable in our community. We offer care to the most hard to serve seniors. We plan to continue, in the proud Halton tradition of excellent care, to understand the needs of our residents and continually work at enhancing their quality of life.
