understand the game better. And they got used to winning close games. In the past the girls got a little nervous and timid in those situations."

The Rebels went on to finish the regular season with an 8-2 record. In the Halton playoffs, they received a first-round bye for the first time since (as near as anyone can figure) the mid-80s.

In their first playoff game, Holy Trinity erased Georgetown leads of nine and seven points to take the lead into the fourth quarter. But the Rebels held them to just five points in the final quarter to win 39-34. The Rebels' Halton playoffs came to an end with a 55-34 loss to Lord Elgin, despite a 24-point game by Adrienne Thompson that Elgin's coach said was the best he'd seen from an opposing player all season.
