
Region to further study pay-per-bag trash plan

Regional council approved a staff recommendation last week to have a pay-pergarbage-bag system assessed by the region's waste management review committee.

Halton is reviewing its waste management strategy, last completed in 1999.

The committee, made up of staff, politicians and members from the public, will assess the merits of a user-fee system. It's not clear when a recommendation on user-fees might come forward, but the entire waste strategy review is anticipated to be completed by spring 2005.


Check the emergency plans of your workplace, the children's schools and the municipality.
