onservation Halton offers some of the best mountain bike trails in all of Ontario. The three parks within Conservation Halton that offer mountain biking incorporate over 70 kilometres of well-marked, easy recreational to technically challenging mountain bike trails. These trails extend through the beautiful Niagara Escarpment region that is endowed with breathtaking views of its limestone cliffs, extensive woodlands and lakes.

Kelso has 22 kilometres of winding mountain bike trails on the majestic

Milton Outlier. Hilton Falls' 33.5 kilometres of woodland trails weave around its reservoir, streams and beaver ponds. Finally, Mountsberg's 16 kilometres of trails pass along the scenic shoreline of its 500-acre lake and extensive woodlands.

Visitors can help protect these beautiful natural habitats, by staying on marked trails, not removing any natural materials, and not littering. Mountain bikers should always keep to the right, yield to all other trail users and remain in control of their bicycle. Helmets are mandatory at all of the Conservation Halton parks.

New rock-climbing guidelines help protect ancient cedars

onservation Halton has established new rock climbing guidelines to help Ipreserve the Escarpment's cedar ecosystem and climbers are co-operating.


Using cedar trees and places where the seeds germinate in cliff ledges and crevices as hand and foot holds can cause damage to cedar trees and prevent future generations from establishing.

"Conservation Halton extends a big thank you to climbers for adhering to the new guidelines," says Ron Kindt, Park Manager. "This co-operation is just the beginning in helping to ensure the future regeneration of our ancient cedars. It has also helped our non-climbing clientele who have noticed and changed their perception of the sport to a more favourable one."

The current policy for rock climbers to abide by includes these measures:

- · A top rope ban is in effect at Mount Nemo. Only trad and sport climbing are permitted.
- · In areas where trees can still be used as top anchors, cedar trees are not to be used as anchors.
- Other tree species must be wrapped with an appropriate protective material.

More information and updates to the policy are posted on www.conservation halton.on.ca. Rock climbing is permitted in selected areas at Kelso, Mount Nemo and Rattlesnake Point.




Rattlesnake Point has three designated sites where experienced rock climbers can scale challenging cliffs.
