Amazing.


In what could only be described as an incredibly insensitive move, considering it happened on the one-year anniversary of the murder of Toronto youngster Holly Jones, Attorney-General Michael Bryant and Community Safety Minister Monte Kwinter made it clear Wednesday the Liberals would not fund the Tory project.

Bryant indicated the Liberals were more eager to play a part in the proposed national sex registry while Kwinter said Toronto already had a good record in tracking sex offenders.

However, after Kwinter met with Toronto Police Chief Julian Fantino, and news reports began to surface about the Grits' decision not to fund the project, the Liberals performed an about-face and announced financial support for the project.

To top it off they blamed the Tories for not implementing it sooner— even though former public safety and security minister Bob Runciman only announced the plan three months before last fall's election.

With this tap-dancing act, the Liberals sent a clear message to the public—saving children is less important than saving face.
