The proposed closure of the William Osler Health Centre Georgetown hospital campus's obstetrics and pediatrics wards has sparked dozens of responses by Independent & Free Press readers.

On June 21, 2002, I gave birth to our stillborn daughter Katelyn at the Georgetown Campus of William Osler Health Centre. It was a planned caesarean delivery. After a very healthy pregnancy, no one expected that Katelyn would be born dead.

From the moment we arrived at Georgetown Hospital and a heartbeat could not be detected, the doctors and nurses at the hospital could not have been more com-

passionate or caring.

Our doctors, Dr. Selvara Gunaratnam, Dr. Deb Zeni and Dr. Paul Zeni were compassionate, caring and professional. The nursing staff including Anna-Marie, Joan, Sharon, Carol, Jan, Heather, Sandy, Terry, Kathryn and Marielle were outstanding. Our family received exemplary care. These people hold a special place in my family's hearts.

I was deeply saddened to read the announcement that the obstetrics ward at the Georgetown Hospital will be closing this summer. Our first child was born there in the spring of 2002. Not only did we receive excellent medical care from the doctors and nurses but, we also received great personal attention. We were planning to have our second child at the Georgetown Hospital this November.

After reading the announcement, I was left with more questions than answers. Where did the astronomical deficit of \$27million come from? How much of this deficit can be attributed to expansion and construction at the Etobicoke and Brampton sites? What has happened to senior management salaries over the last two years? What are the criteria on which the board makes major financial decisions?

Rather than closing our obstetrics department, the hospital should determine the sources of the deficit and make plans to cor-

a time of great sorrow and incredible loss. It is clear in the volunteer work I have since engaged in with Bereaved Families of Ontario, that our experience was truly unique.

To learn that the obstetrics ward at Georgetown Hospital is to be closed is cause for concern. The kind of care my family experienced is difficult to replace. It has never made sense to me as a resident of Georgetown and Halton Region, that the Georgetown Hospital was amalgamated with the Brampton Hospital in Peel and the Etobicoke Hospital in Toronto. These three communities have little in common with each other.

I urge you to review the situation with respect to the impact on Georgetown and surrounding community with the loss of the obstetrics ward at Georgetown.

If anything Georgetown Hospital Campus should consider finding alternative solutions to expanding the obstetrics department for a community that is growing.


