

Garden concert Saturday to aid literacy program

Literacy North Halton suggests area residents sow the seeds of literacy at Garden Harmony, an afternoon event of music and fine art at the Old Seed House Gardens in Georgetown on Saturday.

The free concert features the local Bach Chorale Society, Georgetown Children's Chorus, and local youngster Casey Manierka-Quaile.

Those who love the stage can witness the Globe theatre group performing a scene from its new play, *The City of Angels*. The ever-popular local Casey Highland Dancers take their place as the final act of the Garden concert.

If you have a love of art, artists and vendors will begin displaying their wares at 11 a.m. before the concert begins at 1 p.m.

Other attractions at the show include a silent auction with bids closing at 3 p.m.

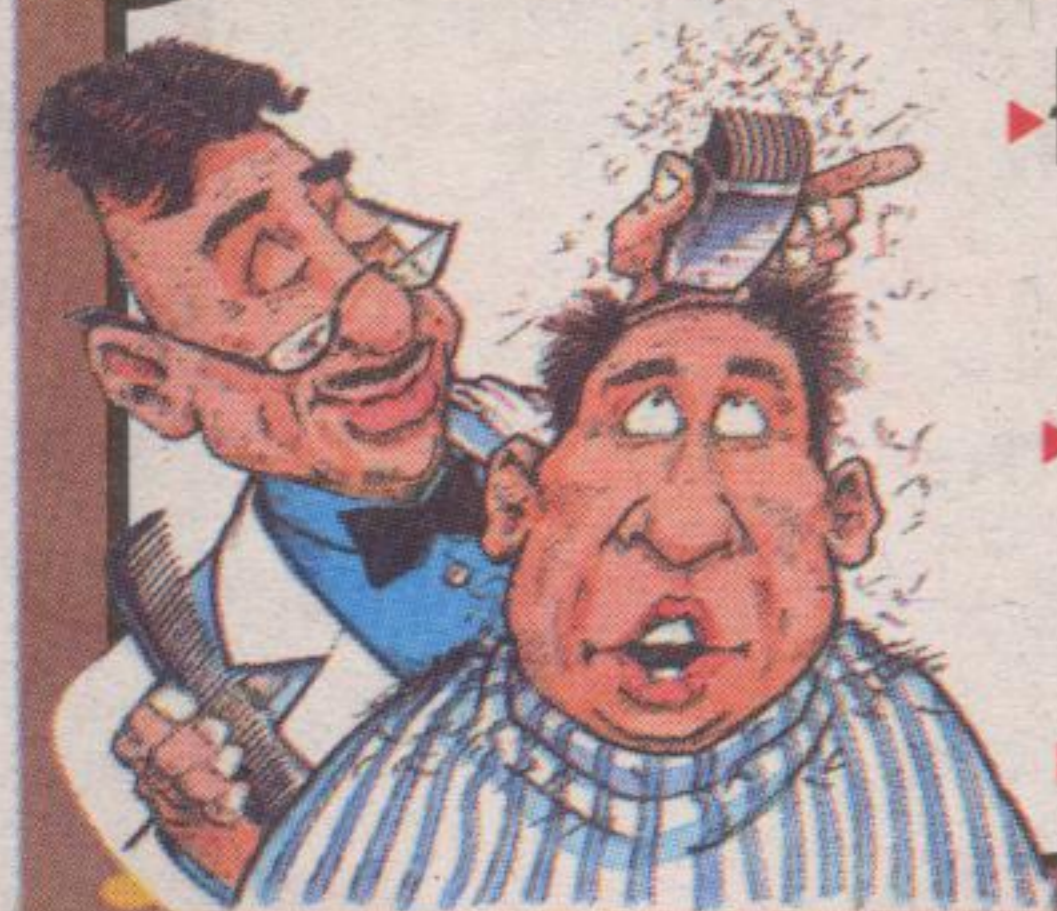

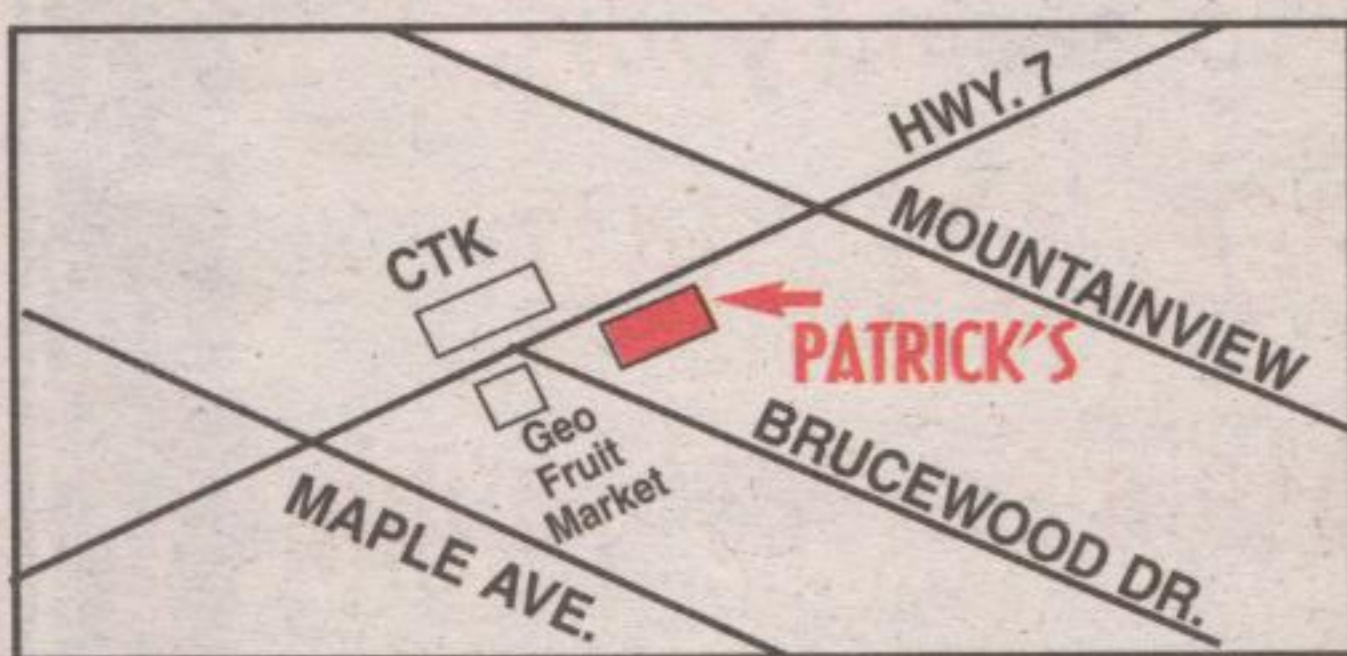
