

## In time for Vegas auto show

# Turner team's truck 'should really move'

Then the annual 2004 SEMA (Specialty Equipment Market Association) show opens at the Las Vegas Convention Center this November, one of the trucks on display will have spent several weeks in Georgetown in preparation for the show.

During the past two years, Jason Turner of Turner Automotive at 332 Guelph Street has been expanding his business to modify and fine-tune diesel trucks to squeeze the last possible bit of horsepower out of them. His clientele has covered everyone from major corporations right down to private individuals.

And the Duramax diesel-equipped 2004 Chevy 2500 that has been in and out of his shop since last November, is a work in progress for Turner and his crew as they have been bolting on more and more modifications to prepare it for the upcoming fall show, which is considered the largest aftermarket automotive equipment show in the world.

"It came in here with a stock Duramax (diesel), putting out about 300 horsepower," said Turner, "By the time we're finished with these modifications, I estimate it will be putting out somewhere in the 680 to 780 wheel horsepower range."

Owned by MBRP Exhaust Inc. of Gravenhurst, the truck is being built as a promotional vehicle, making its way through the trade show circuit, to demonstrate how much horsepower can be squeezed out of a Duramax diesel engine.

And the ultimate goal it to have it completed for the 2004 SEMA Show.

The truck started out as a standard eightfoot box, 2004 Chevy 2500, but after undergoing its changes, it's not looking very stock. Before it was dropped off at Turner's shop, the box had been removed and the frame shortened to accommodate a six-foot box. After the short box was installed, it received a custom paint job from a body shop south of the border

"It's been in and out of here since last fall," says Turner, "That's the way the show vehicle circuit works— they drop it off and we bolt on a couple more things, then it's right back out the door to the next show."

The mods have been nothing short of impressive.

"We've added a performance exhaust system, we've added both propane and nitrous injection systems, and we've also done a turbo upgrade and added a cold air induction system," says Turner, "By stacking three electronic modules on it (only one is allowed for a street legal vehicle) and a full race transmission from ATS Transmissions— we expect this truck should really move."

Turner says all the performance upgrades have been supplied by Bully Dog Technology from the U.S., a company well-known for its diesel engine upgrades.

In addition to the engine performance upgrades, Turner and his crew have also added an air lift and lower suspension system so it can be dropped it to the ground or raised up to maximum height at the flick of a switch, for a maximum cool look, as well as a monster set of oversized performance wheels and tires.

Although Turner Automotive's business is still primarily of a full automotive service and repair nature, the performance diesel truck modification side of the business has been increasing in leaps and bounds, since Turner started two years ago.

As a result, Turner Automotive now offers everything from fuel conservation and mileage upgrades to full-blown race modifications, as well as esthetics, like wheels, lift and lower kits, and performance exhaust kits.



The Town of Caledon, Region of Peel and Credit Valley Conservation have initiated a study to develop a long-term plan for Cheltenham Village which will guide any changes in the community over the next two decades. This study, known as the Cheltenham Village Study, will be undertaken over the next ten months and will result in the preparation of a Community Plan, Servicing Plan and Environmental Management Plan for the village. The Cheltenham Village Study Area is bounded by King Street, Mississauga Road, Boston Mills Road and Chinguacousy Road.

This notice also serves as the Notice of Study Commencement for the Class Environmental Assessment (EA) for Water and Wastewater Servicing for Cheltenham Village, which is being conducted as part of the Cheltenham Village Study. In conjunction with meetings for the public to provide comments on the Cheltenham Village Study, two public information centres on the EA will be held at later dates.

Residents and other stakeholders with an interest in the future of Cheltenham are invited to attend an introductory Community Meeting, which has been arranged as follows:
