August. This is an increase of approximately 25 per cent.

Our Children's and Youth Services Department has had a very successful year so far. Last year, 2,134 children participated in our summer programs. This year attendance increased by almost 60 per cent to 3,388 children.



Georgetown branch had answered over 47 per cent more questions that they had by that time last year.


