

Wanted: Halton Police auxiliary officers

alton Regional Police Service is looking for new auxiliary officers Land is hosting an information session on Wednesday, October 20.

The session will be held at the community room at Halton Regional Police Service headquarters, 1151 Bronte Rd., Oakville.

Auxiliary officers must provide a minimum of 12 hours each month assisting regular police officers.

Auxiliary officers receive over 100 hours of training, including legal training in powers of arrest, ethics and the criminal code, traffic direction duties, notebooks, the court process and use of force training.

They commonly work with police officers at events such as fall fairs, Christmas

parades, and other large-scale yearly events.

They are also on patrol with community patrol officers on busy Friday and Saturday nights.

Volunteer application forms can be picked up at any Halton Regional Police station or the Police Service's website at www.hrps.on.ca under the volunteer programs category. To apply to become an auxiliary officer forward the volunteer application to Sgt. Kevin Maher, Halton Regional Police Service, 1151 Bronte Rd., Oakville, ON, L6M 3L1.


