

Raiders blast Buffalo but Blades' power play too sharp

Six days after handing the Oakville Blades their first loss, the Blades sent the Georgetown Raiders home without a point for the first time this season.

Adding a little more salt to the wound was the fact that it was former Raider Ryan Angelow that did all the damage. Angelow scored three power-play goals in the second period Friday as the Blades handed the Raiders a 3-1 loss.

The Raiders came back to pound the Buffalo Lightning 7-1 on Saturday behind a four-point performance by Kevin Harvey but Friday's loss now leaves the Raiders in a three-way fight for top spot in the Provincial Jr. A Hockey League's West Conference.

Hamilton (10-3-0) currently leads with 21 points. Oakville (9-1-0) beat Hamilton Monday night to move back into a tie for second with Georgetown (8-2-0) with 19 points.

Friday's game was the typical chippy contest that has come to be expected between the Blades and the Raiders. The teams combined for 87 minutes in penalties but the big differ-

ence was Oakville took advantage of its power plays. The Blades capitalized on three of their eight chances while the Raiders came up empty on their seven opportunities.

Tyson Gimblett staked the Raiders to a first-period lead but Angelow connected for a natural hat-trick in just under seven minutes.

Saturday's game was tame by comparison with just eight minor penalties called. But the Raiders didn't need power plays against the Lightning. Tyler Leggo,

Harvey and Richard Hornseth put the Raiders up 3-0 in the first and Harvey found the net again in the second. Buffalo got its only goal 26 seconds into the third, the only shot of 28 to elude John Barrow.

Matt Sitko, Jay Sprague and Kyle Frieday added insurance markers in the third. Glen Hartwell had three assists and John Wheaton and Rob Sgarbossa each had two.

Raider rap: The Raiders retired Ryan Busby's number 19 in a pre-game ceremony Saturday. The Georgetown native recorded 86 goals and 200 points in 153 career games. He is now attending Plattsburg State University in New York. He joins David Bouskill (27), Mike Knoepfli (21) and Stace Page (22) as the only players to have their numbers retired...Friday's game in Bramalea kicks off a stretch of six games in nine days. The Raiders host Hamilton Saturday and play in Hamilton Monday and Streetsville Tuesday.

Bantam AEs sweep Orangeville

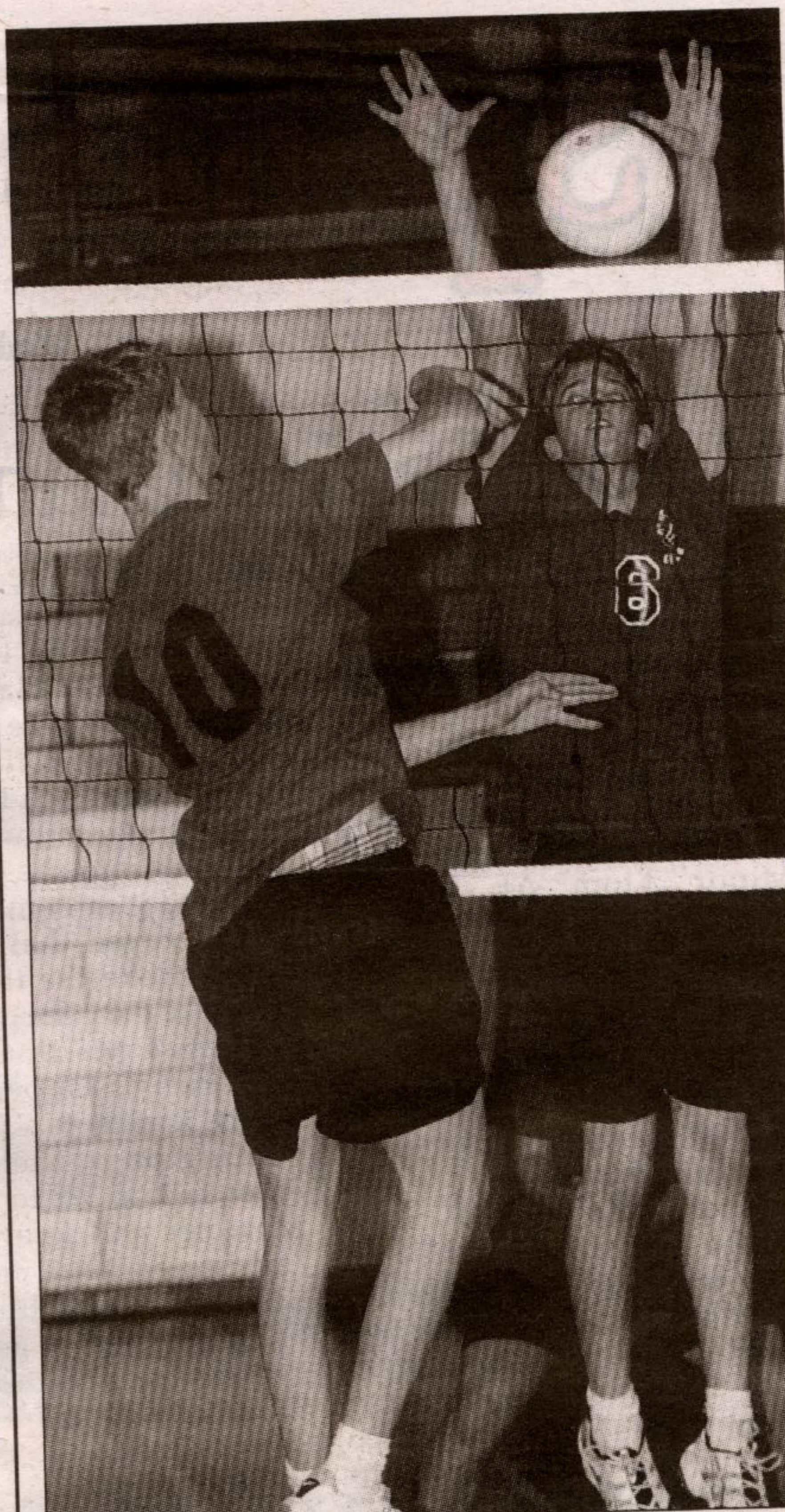

Tooth Chatter

 ADJUSTING TO NEW DENTURES
 FEEL
 At first your new dentures might feel very large in your mouth. You may even experience a gag reaction. This is normal in the beginning. In time, with a little patience and practice, you will adjust naturally to this initial fullness and barely notice it in your mouth.
 SPEECH
 Many new denture wearers have difficulty at first with their speech. Words containing "S" sounds can be a problem. Practicing speech aloud with your new dentures in place will help restore your normal speaking quality. Try reading aloud from a book or magazine in front of the mirror. This will help you to get used to the new speaking position of your tongue and new denture. This will also give you more confidence. Also, before you speak, it is helpful to first bite and swallow. This will "set" the dentures in position and improve clarity.
 EXCESS SALIVA
 When you first receive your new dentures, you will probably notice an increase in the flow of saliva in your mouth. This is a normal response to the unfamiliar new denture. On the average, most people swallow about 600 times a day. For the first few days after receiving your new teeth, you should try to swallow more frequently. After a few days have passed, your mouth will become used to the denture, and saliva flow will return to normal.
