

Will launch zero tolerance policy next month

Town to get tough on bad behaviour in rinks, parks

o combat the growing problem of vandalism and abusive behav-L iour at local arenas, pools and parks, the Town of Halton Hills will launch a zero tolerance to violence and vandalism policy next month.

Halton Hills council approved the policy at Monday's council meeting; ratification is expected at the Nov. 8 meeting. The policy applies to all Town owned/operated facilities, properties including sports fields and parks, and equipment. Town staff on site will be responsible for reporting incidents of bad behaviour.

"I think this is a great thing," said Wards 3 and 4 Regional Councillor Jane

Fogal. "There are some people out there that are going to be really shock-ed to find out what they're doing in the arena isn't kosh-er. There will be some people who do that behaviour

only in the arena and think that's part of the game... I think this will go a long way towards cleaning up the act of some wellmeaning parents perhaps but they step over the line and maybe they don't real-

ize the effect they're having on their own kids."

It is estimated— conservatively-the cost of vandalism and violence at Townowned and operated facili-

ties runs as much as \$10,000 annually, stated in a report by facility supervisor John Archibald.

Town staff, who work at the facilities, say they have noticed over the past few

years a general behavioural change in many of the youth and adults participating in and/or watching the activities, he said. There have been numerous documented incidents of verbal abuse directed at Town staff, officials, coaching staff, participants and members of the general public.

Examples include:

- verbal assaults
- abusive profanity
- threats or attempts to intimidate
- aggressive approaches to another
- individual physical action against another individual
